

Nanda Nagar, Chamoli Disaster July to September 2025



In 2025, Uttarakhand witnessed a devastating monsoon season. Several parts of the state suffered severe loss of life and property due to cloudbursts and landslides. Nanda Nagar region in Chamoli district was also badly affected. Between July and September, places such as **Sera, Dhurma, Mokh, Nanda Nagar Band Bazaar, Kuntari Fali**, and surrounding habitations experienced extensive damage. In total, **231 people from 56 families** were affected; among them, **28 families lost their homes completely**.

On **8 July 2025**, a cloudburst struck three villages at 5 am—**Mokh, Dhurma, and Sera** villages of the Nanda Nagar block. As a result, road connectivity from the **Nandprayag–Nanda Nagar main route** to Mokh and Dhurma was disrupted, cutting off access for **six villages: Sera, Dhurma, Kundi Bansbada, Mokh Malla, and Mokh Talla**. The power supply was also disrupted. Even the footpaths were badly damaged.

Mountain Children’s Foundation (MCF) team visited the affected villages—Mokh, Dhurma, and Sera. The cloudburst caused heavy destruction. Due to continuous rainfall, **20 houses and 50 cowsheds** suffered major damage. Fortunately, people were able to save themselves and also managed to protect many of their belongings and livestock.

- **Mrs. Kamla Devi from Dhurma** shared that the rainfall was extremely heavy and their cowshed collapsed completely, though they were fortunate to rescue their animals in time.
- **Mr. Sohan Singh Bhandari from Mokh Talla** said that the village roads were badly broken, making travel difficult, and for school children, commuting had become very risky. He added that it was hard to predict how long it would take for normalcy to return.



- **Mr. Gopal Singh, a teacher at Government Inter College, Mokh,** stated that the administration was supporting affected families; officials had visited, assessed losses, and assured assistance.

When school children studying at Government Inter College, Mokh—**Sachin, Anjali, Radha, Urmila, and Himanshu**—were asked about their experiences, they shared:



- **Radha** said they come from Mokh village, about 3–4 km away, and the heavy rain had damaged the routes they use to travel.
- **Sachin** said this is their daily route and frequent rains have become common, so it does not affect them as much. (This was before the second devastating flood that swept into their school as well)
- **Mr. Kedar Singh** explained that while the river often rises, this time the cloudburst brought a sudden, massive flow of debris, breaking embankments and pushing mud and rubble into homes and cowsheds.

Daily life was severely disrupted. People still had essential items for the moment, but they feared that if electricity was not restored quickly, their difficulties would increase. Many said they hoped it would not rain again at night, otherwise they would be forced to stay awake all night in fear.

On the morning of the **31 August 2025**, a land slide due to heavy rainfall badly affected the **Bend Bazaar area of Nanda Nagar**, creating panic among residents. Since the weather department had issued warnings of heavy rain and possible cloudburst, the administration was already alert, which helped people protect themselves in time.



Sixteen families were severely impacted and were immediately shifted to safer locations. Around **30–35 families** living in rented homes nearby also saw cracks in their houses, and the administration advised all such families to move to safer places as a precaution. **About 35–40 shops** in Bend Bazaar were vacated, and people moved their goods to safer places. The **MCF team** supported affected families, helping them shift household goods and staying in continuous contact afterward to ensure families did not face further hardship

Relief camps were set up for the affected families where the **local administration, police, and SDRF teams** arranged food and accommodation - **a building near the grain warehouse, Primary School Farkhet, the old degree college building, and Maria Ashram**. On the District Magistrate's orders, all schools and Anganwadi centres were closed for safety.

On **6 September 2025**, **34 children** connected to **33 Bal Sangathans** of Nanda Nagar conducted a survey of the disaster that occurred on 31 August. Among them were **18 children who had participated in Rope and Rescue training**. The children met affected families, checked on their well-being, assessed the losses, and recorded the challenges people were facing. The group included **10 boys and 24 girls**.



During the survey, the children spoke directly to families and tried to understand the difficulties caused by the sudden disaster. They learned that **six families had lost their homes completely**. Some families also needed ration and blankets, as evenings had become cold in the hills and their clothes were buried under the rubble of their damaged homes, making it impossible to retrieve them.

After discussing needs of affected families with the children, MCF distributed relief material on **7 September 2025**. Based on requirements for Six families (**25 people**)- **one month's ration and two blankets per family**.



The MCF team visited these locations and tried to meet families. The team met families in **Fali (Bagwan)** and in **Kuntari (Santnola Tok)**, and recorded their concerns. Families shared that only **2 out of 10 families** had government jobs; most were unemployed and dependent on daily wage labour. Many families were scattered across different shelters or staying with relatives. Parents shared that children were unable to study; without notebooks and books, some children were not attending school. All these homes had collapsed due to landslides. Entry into the affected area was restricted by the administration because the structures were unsafe, and families were accommodated in local relief camps.

Relief was distributed to the following six families:

1. **Mrs. Bindeshwari Devi** (5 members)
2. **Mr. Narendra Singh Rawat** (3 members)
3. **Mrs. Pushpa Devi** (4 members)
4. **Mr. Bhagwan Singh** (5 members)
5. **Mr. Surendra Singh** (4 members)

On the night of **17 September 2025**, around **2 a.m.**, a major disaster struck Nanda Nagar region. Three villages—**Kuntari Fali, Sera, and Dhurma (two sides of the same mountain)**—were badly affected, and **10 people were buried under debris**.

In the **Kuntari area of Fali village**, **eight people** were trapped under the debris of which **7 lost their lives**. One of the affected families belonged to children connected with our Bal Sangathan—this family had four members. **Vikas and Vishal**, twin brothers aged **11**, were members of **Happy Bal Sangathan, Fali**. Their father **Mr. Kunwar Singh** was rescued alive by the rescue team **after 18 hours** and admitted to hospital for treatment. The other three members of the family did not survive.

On **20 September 2025**, the MCF team visited the relief camp at Maria Ashram. The team spoke to affected families, checked on the injured, and spent time with children. The sudden disaster had deeply shaken the community—overnight, everything had changed. Strong homes had turned into piles of debris. Belongings and important documents were buried. People were trying to retrieve items from the rubble, but most had been lost to the disaster.

Mr. Rajendra Singh shared that when heavy rain intensified at night, several families had placed jewellery and documents in a plastic folder and kept it together at **Mr. Laxman Singh's house**, believing it was the safest. Tragically, that house was buried under debris. Later, when excavation was done using a JCB, the folder was found intact and returned, but the incident reflected the trauma and uncertainty families faced.

Recognising immediate needs, the MCF team provided **daily essentials and fruits** to children and affected families. Importantly, the team also tried to support children who were sitting silently, overwhelmed and hopeless. They spoke with them, listened to their pain, and heard their

experiences. To help children cope with fear and grief, the team provided games that could be played in teams and groups such as:

- **Carrom board – 1**
- **Badminton sets – 2 (pairs of shuttlecocks)**
- **Chess boards – 2**

The team noted that during disasters, children are among the most affected, yet relief and rescue efforts often focus only on adults. When a child's entire life changes in a moment, their emotional state is rarely addressed. When the team met children, many ran up to them and began sharing their experiences, especially because they were connected to Bal Sangathans and felt reassured that their facilitators had come to meet them. The team provided:



- **Supportive interactions and Psychological Support:**
During field visits and relief camp interactions, the MCF team engaged children and families in calm, supportive conversations, listened to their experiences, reassured them about safety, and helped reduce fear and panic—particularly among children.
- **Child-friendly engagement and play-based support:**
At relief camps and temporary shelters, children were engaged through games and recreational activities. These interactions helped reduce distress, restore routine, and provide safe spaces for children to interact, play, and express emotions.
- **Special attention to bereaved and highly affected children:**

Children from families that suffered fatalities or severe losses—including Bal Sangathan members—were provided additional emotional support through repeated visits, gentle engagement, and continued follow-up by facilitators familiar to them.



- **Adolescent and girls' well-being support:**
Interactions with adolescent girls included attention to dignity, privacy, and hygiene needs, as well as supportive conversations addressing stress, fear, and uncertainty during displacement.

- **Community presence and continuity:**

The continued presence of familiar facilitators and community workers played a key role in reducing anxiety and reinforcing trust during an extended period of instability.

Kamni, a member of the Happy Bal Sangathan and had participated in Rope & Rescue training in June, was also impacted by the disaster. The team stayed in touch with her continuously after the incident and used her updates to monitor the situation. Kamini shared that when the cloudburst occurred at night, they first ran towards safer areas that they had identified earlier during their Bal Sangathan Meetings and loudly called out to others to move to safety. Some people followed them, and this helped save lives. She said she had learned during training not to panic and to act with patience and courage in such situations.

After speaking with **17 children from 13 affected families**, it became clear that families had lost all daily-use items—clothes, shoes and slippers, and personal hygiene materials. Girls and women especially needed **sanitary pads** and other essential hygiene supplies.

On **24 September 2025**, the MCF team provided children with necessary items including **trousers, shirts, slippers, and shoes**, and sanitary pads for girls and women. In the disaster-affected areas of **Kuntari and Fali**, the government arranged food for all affected families.



Sera and Dhurma were also badly affected, and in this monsoon season, the region faced disaster **twice**—first on **8 July 2025**, and again on **17 September 2025**. The second disaster caused far greater destruction. Road connectivity from the Nandprayag–Nanda Nagar route to these villages was completely cut off. In the initial period, relief materials were delivered by the government through helicopters. **Two people** went missing in strong water currents; after extensive efforts by the administration, their bodies were found several days later.

On **27 September 2025**, the MCF team visited Sera and Dhurma and saw that homes and cowsheds near the river had been washed away, and many houses had turned into heaps of debris. There were heavy losses of livestock—cows, oxen, goats, buffaloes—and widespread damage to farmland and crops. Affected families were staying within the village in other people’s homes. On the night of the disaster, people saved their lives with great difficulty, without trying to rescue belongings. The scene was terrifying—within moments, everything had been swept away. Most people were left with only the clothes they were wearing.

The MCF team met each affected family, recorded details, and prepared lists of household members, ages, and requirements—such as clothes, shoes, slippers, and other items.

On **12 October 2025**, relief material was distributed in Sera and Dhurma. The team met each family, identified specific needs, and prepared a complete package for each family in their name, ensuring they received what they required.

The MCF team remained in continuous contact with affected families, checking needs regularly. During this time, the government and other organisations also extended support. A key demand from affected families was safe and secure rehabilitation, but no suitable nearby land was available. Even now, many families continue to live in rented homes, while some have returned to their old homes.



When life began to return to a limited normal in Kuntari and Fali, families shared that ration and clothes were received in adequate quantity, but they had nothing to keep them safe. As winters approached, children had to sleep on cold floors. Families expressed the urgent need for **divan beds**. After assessing space availability, **13 families** who had both need and space were provided divan beds.

Mountain Children's Foundation Nanda Nagar Team That worked tirelessly during the disaster were —**Darshan Lal, Mahipal Singh, Sangeeta Gaur, Kanti Maindoli, Virendra Singh, Atmaram Raturi and Pradeep Gaur**, Led by the coordinator **Dwarika Prasad Nauni**. **Mr. Devendra Singh Khatri** provided special support as a volunteer.

Voices from the Community

Mrs. Sangeeta Devi (Kuntari Laga Fali):

When the disaster struck our village, the MCF team kept coming to meet us. They helped our children a lot and also provided us with everything we needed. We thank all the workers for the support given by MCF.

Mrs. Reena Devi (Kuntari Laga Fali):

During the disaster of 17 September 2025, MCF team supported us. Their team kept meeting us, checking on our well-being. They encouraged our children and, when we had nothing, brought clothes and provided every essential item we needed.

Mrs. Sushila Devi (Kuntari Laga Fali):

During the disaster, the MCF team stayed with us all the time. They supported us, strengthened our courage, and gave essential materials—ration, clothes, shoes, slippers, and other items—which helped us a lot. They



also gave us a very good divan bed, which we needed badly. I respect the team members from the bottom of my heart and thank them for helping us.

Mr. Rajendra Singh (Kuntari Laga Fali):

MCF supported us a lot during the disaster. At that time, we were not in a state to think clearly. The team members stayed in touch and kept encouraging us. They helped our children come out of fear, gave them play material, and provided essentials like clothes, shoes, and slippers. We received your support throughout.

Mr. Narendra Singh Bisht (Fali):

The support given by MCF team members in this crisis will always be remembered. When we needed help and courage to fight this situation, they were with us, supporting us. We were very worried about our children, and they fulfilled every need of the children and helped them come out of the fearful environment.

Mr. Himmat Singh Negi (Sera):

In the disaster, our homes were washed away and nothing was left. MCF provided essential items that helped us greatly. You came forward to help us, and gave even small daily-use things like toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, oil, comb, shoes, slippers, and clothes. For this, we thank you.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank You, our supporters for your faith and trust in us during the monsoon disasters that affected Nanda Nagar Block, District Chamoli, between July and September 2025.

At a time when communities were facing sudden loss, displacement, and deep uncertainty, your timely support enabled us to respond quickly and meaningfully. Your contributions made it possible to reach affected families with essential relief, support children's immediate needs, and provide psychosocial care during a period of acute distress. Equally important, your confidence in our community-rooted approach allowed us to remain present beyond the initial emergency and continue follow-up support during the early recovery phase.
